Chat from the Chair



I hope you have had a great summer, kept busy and enjoyed the sunshine. After our seasonal break for August, we are back into the regular monthly sequence of meetings at The Pavilion and have the next meeting scheduled for September 12th at 10.00 for a 10.30 start. Details on this month's speaker and subject are further down this newsletter and we hope to welcome you back to have some socialising and fun.

Learn, Laugh, Live is our motto but sometimes we can take it too enthusiastically,

especially when trying a new activity such as pickleball. We've noticed a worrying trend of injuries arising from a variety of u3a activities – mostly minor injuries but at least a couple of incidents have resulted in broken bones or lost teeth. While the demographics of our membership mean that trips and falls are inevitably going to be more likely, many of these injuries could and should be avoidable with a bit of common sense

Firstly, while our group organisers can offer advice, in the end it's your personal responsibility to decide if you feel capable of trying any new activity. If you're unsure then take a look into the group organiser's eyes and see if they look worried (or show blind panic!).

Secondly, please make sure you kit yourself out with suitable shoes for whatever activity you intend to try. If you wear glasses or contact lenses then please consider whether they are suitable. Varifocals for example are tricky for badminton or ball games.

Finally, please don't try to play like an expert immediately. Give yourself time to learn – it's only a game. We all want you to try new activities but please take care and pace yourselves.

Learn, Laugh, Live but please do it Sensibly, Socially & Safely!

Slugs & Snails – Thank you to so many of you who responded to my brief item in the last newsletter. I'm sure we'll cover much of your feedback in the springtime but one key point that popped up was about the types of slug pellets – past and present.

The old metaldehyde based pellets were banned from sale <u>and use</u> back in April 2022 and replaced with the ferric phosphate based ones we have now. Ferric phosphate is naturally occurring, organic and safe for animals. The old metaldehyde pellets were poisonous to slugs, snails, birds, hedgehogs, cats, dogs and the rest. Do you maybe still have some old ones in your garden shed? You might want to check the label as it's illegal to <u>use</u> them so they should be taken to the Recycling Centre on the Salterton Road where they can be safely disposed of (technically, there is an exception that allows their use in 'permanent greenhouses' but would you want to eat the resulting fruit and veg?)

Social Committee

Visit to Cotehele – 10th July.





Only a small coach could be taken to the National Trust property, Cotehele, being located on the Cornish side of the river Tamar down narrow lanes. We were blessed once again with lovely weather and so were able to maximise the time spent outside visiting the gardens, quay and mill. The house is mostly Tudor and from the mid-16th century was largely a second home, so retains much of its early history. It was a lovely day and a very tranquil place for a visit.



Forthcoming Events

Eden Project - Monday 16th September, cost per person £40

This trip is designed for you to explore the Eden Project at your leisure. This environmental project was set up in 2001 and consists of two large indoor covered biomes and gardens of roughly 30 acres. The coaches should arrive at approximately 11am and depart at 4pm, which should give plenty of time to explore the biomes and garden. Each of the two biomes feature a different part of the world - the Mediterranean and tropical rainforests. There are regular free talks during the day that members can join or just enjoy exploring and self-discovery.

The coach will pick us up at 9am from the Exmouth coach park, behind Exmouth train station and return there for 6pm. You are free to bring your own packed lunch, but there are plenty of catering outlets on site. The Eden Project prides itself in responsibly sourced, freshly made food. Please bring your own reusable cup as they no longer offer single use cups for takeaway drinks.

Health and safety considerations: there is a fair amount of walking in exploring this amazing project. The paths at the Eden Project climb steeply up and down the slopes of the former clay mine, there are plenty of resting places and toilet facilities. The indoor biomes are covered by a material that transmits UV, so don't forget your sun cream.

Dartmouth Food Festival - Friday October 25th, cost per person £19

The Dartmouth Food festival is held each year on the quayside and in the Royal Avenue Gardens. There are loads of stall holders selling local produce and crafts. It makes a lovely day out without having to worry about parking. The coach leaves Exmouth at 9.30am from the coach park, behind Exmouth station, returning to Exmouth at approximately 5pm. You are free to explore the food festival at your leisure or other local attractions. The coach will pick us up at Dartmouth quay at approximately 3pm. **Health and safety considerations:** it is all outdoors, so it can be hot when it's sunny and wet when it's raining. It is mostly on tarmac or pavements but the three large marquees can get very crowded and those with mobility issues may feel a bit jostled as it can get quite busy.

Olympic Gold

At a Family History group meeting and at a recent zoomed Coffee & Chat, I mentioned some Olympic trivia. It was suggested at the latter that I should write it up for the newsletter, as more members might be interested, so here it is.

The 1924 Olympics Games were held in Paris, as were the recent 2024 Olympics. The Games have certainly grown in those 100 years.

In 1924 there were no medal ceremonies. Medals, engraved with the winner's name and sport on the rim, arrived by post!

In 1924 the same medal design was used for the summer and the inaugural winter Games. The obverse shows a winning athlete helping a fallen athlete. I can't identify all the sports illustrated on the reverse, but they include polo, javelin?, rowing, sailing, skiing, relay?, boxing, archery?, rugby, discus, shot put, football, shooting?, and fencing . The lyre harp represents the cultural competitions held at the same time, with a sports-inspired theme - architecture, literature, music, painting and sculpture.
